Night Sky Party Friday, January 7 at 5:00 p.m.



1,000 Books Before Kindergarten



1,000 Books Before Kindergarten is a program designed to foster reading as a life-long pleasure activity. Its benefits aren't limited to reading and literacy: reading together is a great time for parents, grandparents, brothers and sisters to spend time together. Any child under age 5 who is not currently enrolled in Kindergarten is eligible to participate. Families may enroll all their eligible children at the same time. Reading logs are kept and submitted for each child. Prizes are awarded for reading 200, 500, 800 and 1,000 books; children receive stickers for each reading log submitted.

The YouTube Phenomenon Revisited

There has been much written about YouTube in the past few years. How YouTube democratized video production, how it has changed our notion of what is acceptable and what is watchable, and the way major media companies create and disseminate videos. Yet, what I find most interesting is how it can affect us as individuals.

I have owned my own tools and been making things since the 7th grade, just short of 50 years now, and lately I keep asking myself why it seems that in the last few years I have learned so many techniques that I wish that I had known earlier in my life. Then it dawned on me that the difference between the first 40 years and the last 10 has been the addition of watching YouTube instructional videos. Not only can you find tutorials for just about any skill you need to complete a project, if you refine the search you can probably find instructions for the particular tool or product you are using.

Oftentimes there are multiple videos to choose from and the trick becomes finding the instructor that best fits your purpose. I like instructors who don't use a lot of time explaining what they are going to teach before actually teaching. As an example, when learning to use the free design program Inkscape, I found an instructor who uses the tag "Logos by Nick". By watching his tutorials at the same time I have the Inkscape program open, I can follow along and practice. In this way I have gained the use of many new design techniques.

Next time you need to tackle a project, even one you have done before, consider taking the time to find a YouTube tutorial you can learn from and you might gain from this method of learning and adding skills to your resume for both work and play.
