CITIZENS WORK WITH SCIENCE

Picture a scientist in your head and likely the stereotypical image of a person in a white coat, probably wearing glasses, surrounded by equipment in a pristine laboratory appears. But a scientist is anyone who uses the scientific method for finding answers. And what is this but a system for determining answers through observation, experimentation and logical reasoning, something many of us use everyday. Science is for everyone and never has that been more true than now.

Science has been practiced since ancient times, but the scientific method was first recorded by Francis Bacon in his 1620 treatise Novum Organum, and he is considered the father of modern science. The scientific method is a process of using observations to form questions and a hypothesis and then devise experiments to test the hypothesis and deduce conclusions based on the data and evidence gathered from the experiment. To reduce bias It is important to the process that the conclusions be questioned and the experiments be run multiple times, preferably by different scientists in different settings. Once the conclusions and answers are found to be repeatable and predictable they may be considered either a theory or a law.

If you would like to change your image of a scientist to the person looking at you in the mirror, there are many ways to get involved. April happens to be citizen science month and the folks at scistarter.org would like your help. There are many experiments to choose from and they make it easy for you to contribute. Simply visit their website, create an account and click on the participate tab. Choose a topic which interests you and follow the instructions.

Other organizations also participate in Citizen Science Month including Arizona State University School for the Future of Innovation in Society (SFIS), The All of Us Research Program, through the National Library of Medicine (NLM) and the Network of the National Library of Medicine (NNLM). More information about the partnership, funding, and outreach opportunities can be found at allofus.nnlm.gov.

Or perhaps you have questions of your own that do not directly fit with these established programs. Almost everyday staff and patrons practice informal and exciting science in the IDEA LAB. The library provides equipment and materials with support to help you achieve your pursuit whether it is small or large, humble or audacious. The IDEA LAB holds open makerspace every Friday and Saturday from 2 to 4pm.




